Scandinavian Festival celebrates heritage of Ephraim and Sanpete County

EPHRAIM--The city of Ephraim in the Mormon Pioneer National Heritage Area's Little Denmark district will hold its annual Scandinavian Heritage Festival Friday, May 26 and Saturday, May 27 at and around Snow College.

The colorful event, now in its 42nd year, will kick off Friday at 10 a.m. with the Scandinavian Heritage Conference at the Karen Huntsman Library at Snow College.

Dr. Vance Larsen of the Horne School of Music at Snow College will talk about the early musical history of Ephraim, Snow College and the Sanpete Valley.

Larsen will be followed by Richard Stevens, retired Utah Division of Wildlife Resources research biologist and former director of the Great Basin Experiment Station, who will share his insights on the Blackhawk War and its significance to the Ephraim and Sanpete County.

Beginning at noon on Friday, booths along College Avenue (100 North) will offer foods such as Danish aebleskivers, Scandinavian bread, Sanpete BBQ turkey, and local artisan bratwurst made from elk, bison, pork and rabbit.

From noon to 6 p.m. on Friday, and again from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Saturday, craft booths will vend Scandinavian items, traditional American items and some modern favorites. The craft booths will also be along College Avenue.

On Friday evening, a Scandinavian dinner will be served at the Greenwood Student Center. The menu will feature Swedish limpu bread, along with roasted pork loin with cranberry apple stuffing, Swedish meatballs and a variety of side dishes and

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desserts. The cost is \$13 for adults and \$7 for children 12 and younger.

This year, for the first time, the festival will include fireworks after dusk on Friday, viewable on the playing field east of the Greenwood Student Center.

An enlarged Olde Crafter's Village will get into action Saturday morning at a new location behind the Ephraim Bishop's Storehouse on Main Street.

The village will feature 13 crafters demonstrating, displaying and selling needlework, wood carving, blacksmithing, butter making and more. Several crafters will offer hands-on children's activities for a nominal fee.

Additionally, the Ephraim Co-op, a nonprofit crafter's gift shop at 96 N Main St., will host a quilt show both days.

Saturday festivities will begin with the Ephraim Lions Club aebleskiver (round Danish pancakes) breakfast at the Snow College Stake Center pavilion, 75 East 100 North. The breakfast will run from 8-10 a.m. and will cost \$7 per person and \$25 per family.

A parade with close to 50 entries, including many with a Scandinavian theme, will travel down Main Street at 10 a.m.

At noon, four Vike-on-a-Bike races, which include family, beginning, novice and sport categories, will take off from Snow College. The course takes riders around the outskirts of Ephraim, including along trails in mountain foothills east of town.

Bus tours at 11:30 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. will take visitors to historic sites in Ephraim, including 19th Century buildings and homes built by Scandinavian and other Mormon pioneer settlers.

Both days, the Pioneer Heritage Company from Provo will stage an encampment in front of the Snow Social Sciences Building on 100 East in which company members will reenact various aspects of pioneer life.

Throughout the festival, a variety of musicians will entertain the crowds at the main stage in front of the Noyes Building on 100 North on the Snow College campus, while storytellers will regale visitors, especially children, with tales both tall and true on the northwest lawn of the Social Sciences Building.

Other events include a quilt show, car show, tours of historic log cabins and foot races.

More detailed information and maps are available at Scandinavianfestival.org. Additionally, a free magazine with the festival schedule and stories on all events will be distributed at the information booth on 100 East and at the Ephraim Co-op on Main Street.



An integral part of the Scandinavian Festival is a celebration of pioneer crafts. This year an Old Crafters' Village will return with artisans demonstrating and selling some of what are almost-forgotten handicrafts.

The Mormon Pioneer Heritage Area is a federally designated area of central and southern Utah running along the beautiful and historic U.S. Highway 89 — including the All-American Road Utah State Route 12, and Capitol Reef Scenic Byway Utah State Route 24, which both intersect with U.S. 89 and together form the MPNHA’s Boulder Loop. The area includes the counties of Sanpete, Sevier, Piute, Wayne, Garfield and Kane.
