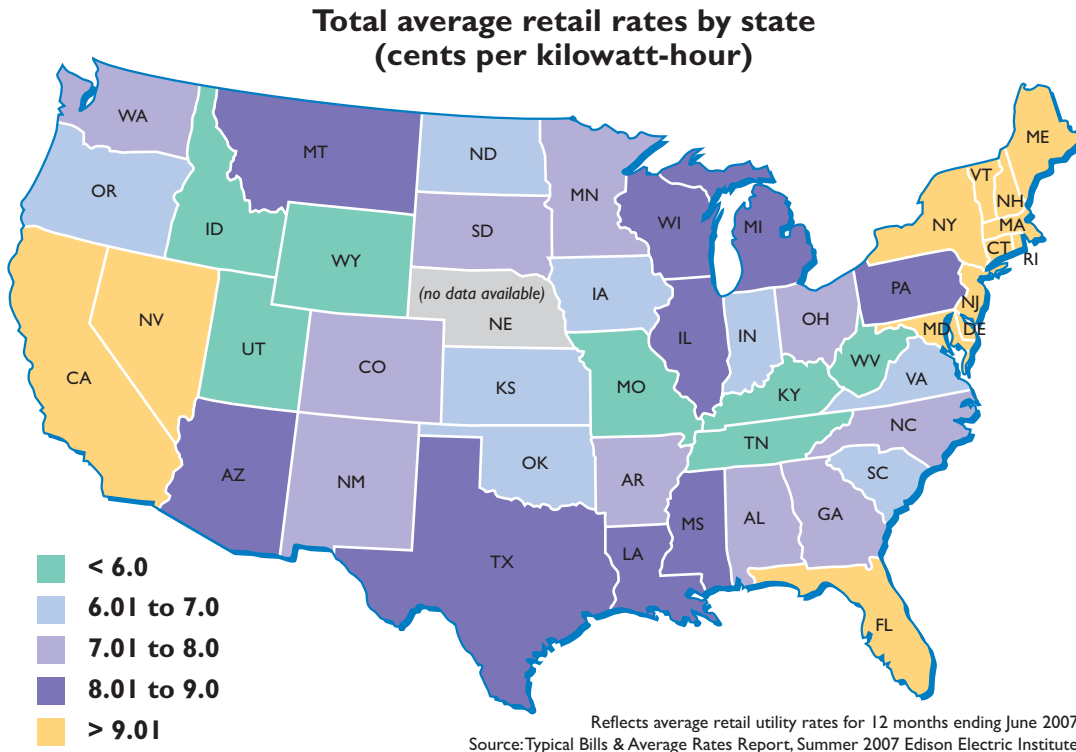

States served by Rocky Mountain Power have some of the lowest rates in the nation. The review below compares average rates from all investor-owned utilities in the U.S. including residential, commercial and industrial customers.

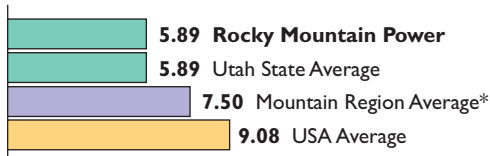
Average retail rates by state ranged from 4.57 to 16.87 cents per kilowatt-hour. The national average was 9.08 cents per kilowatt-hour. Of the 177 companies surveyed, Rocky Mountain Power's rates in Utah, Wyoming and Idaho were among the lowest of investor-owned utilities in the West.

This map shows total average retail rates by all investor-owned utilities by state.

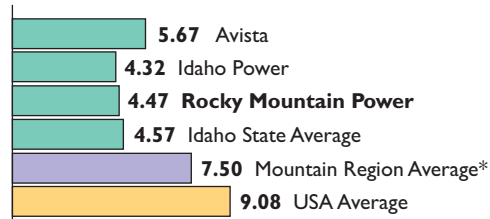


Here's how Rocky Mountain Power's rates compare to the regional and national averages in Utah, Wyoming and Idaho. Please turn this over for other western state comparisons.

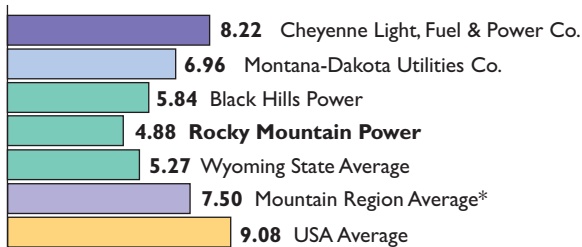
